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First Year Live-On Requirement Guidelines

**Policy:** First-year undergraduate students enrolled as full-time students, as defined in the

*University of Georgia Undergraduate Bulletin*, will be required to live in campus residence halls. The requirement begins with the entering class of Fall 2004.

## **Purpose:**

The purpose of this policy is to provide guidelines regarding the UGA First Year Live-On Requirement.

## Scope:

This policy applies to all first-year undergraduate students living in residence halls.

## **Background:**

The University of Georgia is committed to providing all of its students with a comprehensive educational experience. There are numerous educational and social benefits for first year students living in the residence halls that may not be realized by those living off-campus. With this understanding, UGA requires all first-year students to live on campus effective Fall Semester, 2004.

## **Procedures:**

- I. Students first enrolling in the summer are required to live in the residence halls during the Summer, Fall, and Spring Semesters. Students first enrolling in the fall are required to live in the residence halls during the Fall and Spring Semesters. Students first enrolling in the spring are required to live in the residence halls during the Spring Semester.
- II. Cancellation of enrollment and revocation of student status at the University of Georgia may take place as a result of failing to comply with the UGA First Year Live-On Requirement Policy. This may be the result of:
  - A. Providing false or misleading information in connection with a request for exemption
  - B. Failing to comply by not registering for housing and/or assuming occupancy in a University residence hall,
  - C. Revocation of a residence hall contract, and/or
  - D. Receiving a judicial sanction that requires removal from a University residence hall.
- III. If a first-year student is removed from University Housing, he/she will also be suspended from the institution.
